#### FROM THE VICAR'S DESK

"So those who welcomed his (Peter's) message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added." Acts 2.41

Not even the most wildly optimistic evangelical would expect these sorts of numbers from their work on behalf of God. We would be hard-put to come up with that number of Anglicans on the North Shore, and yet after Peter's address, people were lining up to become members of a sect of Judaism that promised a tough time on earth and heaven after it. Something had to be moving for this to happen. People don't usually volunteer for certain hardship unless there was something in it for them and certainly not for something as intangible as "life hereafter"... or are we the ones that are selling humanity short?

We live in a growing climate of hostility toward faith...any faith, or so we think. Secularism is the order of the day where we have the incongruous sight of a Quebec that used to be so "Catholic", banning any religious symbol worn on the job by public servants. We have debates and diatribes from people on show, actively decrying Christianity and ridiculing anyone who subscribes to a belief system. And yet there is just as

much interest in spirituality as there has ever been. It is just not in the traditional faith groups. There are TV shows on ghosts and hauntings, clairvoyance, crystals, aliens from outer space influencing early civilizations, and eternal life gets a look-in with the rise of vampire serials. We of the Faith will dismiss all this as just so much dross, but these shows would not exist, much less continue, unless they had a following. So we cannot cite a lack of interest in spiritual matters as a reason for our own decline. Maybe, just maybe, if we look at what we publish about ourselves in the broad sense, or see ourselves as others see us, or really examine what we stand for, will we get a picture that will explain where the church stands today.

Churches have traditionally been the centres of particular communal activities. They have often been the social hub of the community, bringing people together for what the church would call fellowship. They were also seen as a port-of-call for those who were destitute and in need. Alongside this role was also that of a social service, providing help to all who required a listening ear or an advocate. One of the more important roles was to provide the raison d'etre for all the activities of the church. The church was the place where the reasons for living a good life were expressed, taught and passed on. In a word, the church had a role in the spirituality of the community.

Today we have to face the fact that our community is looking to other institutions to fulfill these roles, barring the spiritual. The only aspect of the church that differentiates us from these other institutions is the fact that we are a place of spiritual authority and practice. Paradoxically, we seem to be less comfortable about practicing this role in our community when really it is our prime directive. The churchy word for what we need is "renewal", spiritual renewal, where we rediscover

what being a Christian is meant to be in our own time. All people, including the atheists, want to have their life mean something. All parents hope that their child will grow up to be a productive and positive member of the community. We as a church, are uniquely placed to be able to offer all people an opportunity to find their spiritual path. What it will take for that to happen in reality, is that we will start with ourselves first, before we take that message to others.

I have been in ordained ministry now for thirty nine years, and have worked in seven parishes. In all that time and in all those places the task for the church has been the same. Believe and practice it first before you take it anywhere else!

#### ST. STEPHEN'S PARISH COUNCIL

The Chairperson of the Council shall be the most senior Warden who shall preside at all meetings. If the most senior Warden is unavailable the next most senior Warden shall preside.

The Council shall consist of the Rector, the Wardens, the Treasurer, the Trustees, Delegates to Synod and Alternate Delegates to Synod, and Members at large. They are selected by a nominating committee called at the end of the year by the Senior Warden.

The Parish Council duties include ensuring that the Church is run effectively and that all steps are taken to ensure good financial and administrative management of the Church. Reports by members to review work that is completed or in process keep everyone informed of what is happening at the Church and what areas need attention.

Further reports by Chairs of Church Committees may be requested for a meeting.

#### MEET THE NEW WARDEN - JOHN SEDDON

At the Annual Vestry Meeting held February 9th, 2014, the Vicar was pleased to announce that John Seddon has agreed to act at Warden for a three year term.

Though John's parents, Kay and Arthur, lived in Shanghai, John was born in Vancouver on February 19, 1929, where Kay had come be with her parents to await John's arrival. After returning to Shanghai as a babe in arms John, in time, attended Cathedral School until he was 10 when he was sent to England where it was expected that he would go all the way through the English school and university system but, after one term at Seaford near Brighton, the war and the bombing started.

John's parents decided they would leave England. They settled in Vancouver where John was enrolled at St. George's School and from where he graduated in 1946 with Senior Matriculation as age 17. After two years in the Arts faculty at UBC John entered Law School from which he graduated in 1951 with a BA and LLB.

From the age of 14 except for a trip to England to visit relatives, John spent summers working in logging camps, a fish cannery, and at Standard Oil of B.C.

John joined the law department of B.C. Electric Co. (now B.C. Hydro) and after a few years joined the law firm of Buell Ellis Sargent and Russell later Buell Ellis then Richards Buell Sutton where he became a senior partner and where he practiced law for 44 years until his retirement at age 67.

After retirement John started volunteering at the West Vancouver Seniors' Centre where he has been a woodworking supervisor for close to 15 years.

Beth and John were married in April 1952 by Rev. Carter at St. Stephen's Church (the old church). They have four sons and a daughter and four grandchildren.

Beth and John became parishioners at St. Christopher's and, after moving residence they joined St. Stephen's where John's mother had been a parishioner and a member of the Altar Guild.

The following are excerpts from the interview:

#### Best advice I've ever received:

The best advice I ever received came in the form of a question: "Do you feel you are fulfilling your potential?" This question made me really evaluate whether I had been making the most of my life. At any given time, we each have a unique combination of knowledge, skills, experiences, education, resources, network of influence, and opportunities, in addition to passions and

interests. If we want to help solve the world's greatest problems or even just make our lives count for something, we have to honestly ask ourselves whether we're making the most of what we've got and, if not, what we can be doing differently. One of the greatest things about potential is that it is not fixed. Every new day and every new experience stretches us to something/someone new. You can fulfill your potential one day, but the next day have a new level to fulfill. The key is choosing to be humble and teachable, denying comfortable ignorance or undue arrogance in favour of the unlimited possibilities that come with learning, growing and collaborating. It is a daily choice to make our lives count and it requires a daily commitment to fulfill our (new) potential.

#### **Worst Advice I've ever received:**

"Stop being yourself. It intimidates others." Okay, so maybe it wasn't spoken in those exact words but that's the message that I and many others have heard in various forms over the years. I am not sure whether it's meant to be some sort of backwards compliment, but I do know that it has come across as discouraging to many a passionate, talented, smart or successful individual. I've always found that greatness in any form tends to produce two reactions: 1) intimidation and insecurity, or 2) appreciation and inspiration. Choose to practice the latter reaction when you encounter someone spectacular and try not to let others' insecurities keep you from letting out whatever greatness has been instilled in you. After all, your best self is what will serve society best.
